Two MoUs boost telecoms research

The Memorandums of Understanding signed between Telekom Malaysia and GEC's Marconi SpA and GEC-Marconi were witnessed by the Malaysian Prime Minister Dr Mahathir and GEC's Managing Director George Simpson at GEC-Marconi Materials Technology, Caswell.

Marconi SpA and Telekom Malaysia will research and develop advanced telecommunications technologies for multimedia applications with particular regard to Malaysia's Multimedia Super Corridor. This includes developing Malaysia Telekom's optical amplifier, which facilitates signal transmission over long distances at very high speeds.

GEC-Marconi and Telekom Malaysia will create a research and development partnership in gallium arsenide microchip technology. This is being increasingly used to facilitate the very high frequency telecommunication transmissions required for applications such as satellites and smart cards






