Gordon Bussey has been the Historical Consultant to Marconi plc (formerly GEC) since 1994 and has advised organizations across the world on the history of communications. He is the author, since 1976, of numerous publications on wireless-related subjects. Notably, he collaborated with Keith Geddes on the widely acclaimed book, *The Setmakers.* His recent works include *The first use of wireless by the Royal family 1898*, issued for a commemorative re-enactment in 1998, and *Marconi Centenaries in 1999*. He has been involved with exhibitions at national museums since 1977, and, most recently, with the Marconi section at the *BBC Experience*, Broadcasting House, in 1997.

In 1991 he was elected a Fellow of the Royal Historical Society.

To commemorate the centenary of Marconi's great achievement in bridging the Atlantic, the Royal Mint will be releasing a specially designed two-pound coin for circulation in the United Kingdom. During the preparation of this legal tender coin to be issued in 2001, Gordon Bussey has acted as historical consultant to the Royal Mint and its artists.
