Meet the Medway society at the forefront of vintage aviation

Since 1975, the Medway Aircraft Preservation Society Ltd (MAPSL) has restored vintage aircraft to take to the skies once again or to go on view for people to admire.

Based at Rochester Airport, the volunteers have restored Spitfires and Hurricanes as well as a Fairey Battle bomber and a Boulton Paul Defiant for the RAF Museum at Hendon.

In 2010, the society received A Queen's Award for Voluntary Service in recognition of its work preserving rare and unique aircraft. Her Royal Highness The Duchess of Cornwall visited MAPSL's workshops and agreed to become one of the 'Maps Chaps' and became the patron.

As part of our (Medway Council) improvement works at Rochester Airport, the society has moved into a purpose-built hangar, which is due to officially open next year.

Medway Sea Cadets celebrate 80th anniversary

The Medway Towns Sea Cadet Unit is celebrating its 80th anniversary this year.

The unit became number 238 of the Sea Cadet Corps in 1942 and has been providing sea cadet training to young people across Medway ever since.

Members of the unit are referred to as the Ships Company and there is a junior section, aged 10 to 12 and a seniors' section, aged 12 to 18, who parade every Monday and Wednesday at St Mary's House, Royal Sovereign Avenue in Gillingham.

The Sea Cadets is not a pre-service organisation, but a charity, which provides training to young people using Royal Naval themes including training on water in different types of boats, first aid training, mechanical engineering, mountain biking, training for the Duke of Edinburgh award and much more.

As part of its anniversary celebrations, the unit is encouraging new recruits to join them and find out more.
